### Goals

- Provide a fresh local produce afternoon snack to children K-5 at DN 1X per month.
- Educate students about nutritional value of each produce item.
- Educate students about local seasonal foods available at local farms.
- Provide a recipe for children to bring home that celebrates the monthly snack item.

### How:

- Allocate PTA funds to pay for 225-250 serving size portions per month, estimating costs for year with flexibility based on seasonal options (see sample chart, pg 2).
- Farm Fresh Snack Day coincides with monthly assembly. A volunteer, staff member (kitchen, education, administrative, other), or student can provide a two minute description -- provided by DN Wellness Committee -- of the nutritional content of that snack item, it's local relevance, one historical use, and a reminder that the recipe will be available to take home and "try out."
- Wellness Committee will provide recipes to hand out.
- Determine one serving size portion with DN kitchen staff prior to ordering item for the month as appropriate.
- Partner with Zone 7 to purchase farm fresh snack. Zone 7 is a local farm to table distribution company. Please see page 3 for more details about Zone 7.

### To Brainstorm/Discuss:

- **Delivery**: Zone 7 hopes to deliver to our school. In the instance that they cannot, can a volunteer arrange a pick up in Frenchtown, NJ 1X per month?
- Prep: Prepare snack items. Low prep is ideal. Wash and hand out whole is best. In some instances, we may need to peel or chop. Who can do this? Kitchen Staff or volunteers?
- Serving format: Some items may need a napkin or paper plate (greens, peas, etc). Other items are just in hand (fruits, carrots, whole peppers, etc).
- **Distribute to kids**: Who would be able to pass these snacks out and should it happen before or after assembly?

### Report on the progress made in attaining the goals of the wellness policy (REQUIRED):

Instructional Garden is in place at Durham Nockamixon Elementary School-Students gain experience in planting, caring for the garden, harvesting, and use of the vegetables in the cafeteria. The garden hands on learning experience, cooking club, and teamwork activities are provided.

Composting is in place at Durham Nockamixon Elementary School- Teaching students about composting is an opportunity to show how important systems like the life cycle of a plant and biodegradation work.

Recycling is in place at Durham Nockamixon Elementary School- Students are introduced to recycling practices, this displays proper waste management, and accountability to school aged students.

Meal and menu Management- a variety of fruits and vegetables are offered each day with each meal. Fresh vegetables as well as fresh fruits are offered. Offering less canned and frozen fruits and vegetables is a continuous goal.
