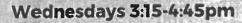

Report on the progress made in attaining the goals of the wellness policy (REQUIRED): Instructional outdoor space is in place at Springfield Elementary School- When the garden is in place, Students can gain additional experience in planting, caring for the garden, harvesting, and use of the vegetables in the cafeteria. The garden ands on learning experience, cooking club, and teamwork activities are provided.							

Composting is in place at Springfield Elementary School- Teaching students about composting is an opportunity to show how important systems like the life cycle of a plant and biodegradation work.

Recycling is in place at Springfield Elementary School- Students are introduced to recycling practices, this displays proper waste management, and accountability to school aged students.

Meal and menu Management- a variety of fruits and vegetables are offered each day with each meal. Fresh vegetables as well as fresh fruits are offered. Offering less canned and frozen fruits and vegetables is a continuous goal.

Palisades School District provides a 3 year comprehensive plan. Continued efforts in educating the stakeholders, on USDA requirements, and the benefits of good nutrition, and encourage a participative opportunity to provide feedback is a "Food choice" goal, through Health class, education program and services presentations to the public, back to school nights, open house and wellness committee meetings, encouraging student and parent involvement.
