# BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS FOR THE 2023-24 SCHOOL YEAR:

On June 7th, the School Board approved the Final Budget with a 0% tax increase for taxpayers for the upcoming school year. Over the past 10 years, our tax increases have been set at 0% (3 years) or less than 1% (7 years) including gaming revenue. The millage rate will remain the same at 117.74 mills.

Also of note, Palisades SD has the second lowest millage rate in Bucks County only second to New Hope Solebury School District that brings in twice as much earned income tax than Palisades (See chart on page 3.)

Capital projects, those that are funded through district savings, will include the following for the upcoming school year: safety and security upgrades, Cold gym locker room upgrades at the high school, air conditioning at the middle school, Tinicum roof replacement, Wastewater treatment plant upgrades, and stadium lighting upgrades.

I will forever be thankful for all the people I have interacted with during my tenure on the school board. I know I have gained some life long friendships out of this endeavor and will always be appreciative.



### **BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS CONT...WHAT FACTORS HAVE AN IMPACT?**

| Over the last 14 years, the Charter School budget has increased 314% and the pension costs have increased 632%. ### HERE IS THE BOTTOM LINE...

Outside of planned savings to cover increased retirement costs, the capital projects mentioned above and Tech School renovations, the Final Budget uses \$1,594,486 from Fund Balance to balance the district budget.

NOTE: The gaming relief funds that come directly from the Commonwealth, are slightly lower than the 22-23 year and the District has 5 more properties qualifying for the Homestead/Farmstead exemption. The combination of the two will result in a decrease of the gaming relief reduction of \$0.86 per tax bill. Even with a 0% tax increase, there will be a slight increase in tax bills of \$0.86 due to this change from the state gaming funds.

# COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2023-26

On June 7th, the School Board unanimously approved the Comprehensive Plan for the 2023-26 school years. This process is one that is required by the PA Department of Education every three years. Approval of the Plan means that the Board has approved the goals as presented as direction for our administration over the life of the Plan(\*).

At Palisades, we pride ourselves in developing a Comprehensive Plan based on the feedback and input of our community at large. From Steering Committee members, to Action Planning Teams and surveys that are distributed, all stakeholders in our community have a voice in this process. Going forward, the planning teams will involve stakeholders to iron out all of the details involved in executing the Plan.

We are grateful for all of those who have contributed to the Plan and look forward to your continued support as we move forward.

(\*) Please note that any budgetary requests that are proposed as a result of the details of the Plan will be brought before the Board during our budgeting process beginning again for the 2024-25 school year in the Fall of this year. As is always the case, the budget is voted on separately by the Board at the end of each school year.

### Focus Areas of the Plan:

- Academic Excellence: student preparedness, use of technology, and additional offerings for students.
- Communication: developing, distributing, and receiving timely and meaningful content and receiving feedback in a timely and efficient manner.
- Facilities: prioritizing infrastructure and building repair needs to enhance high quality instruction, as well as evaluating the safety and security of our buildings.
- Student Services: bullying prevention, improving mental health, as well as increasing public awareness regarding food services and student wellness as defined by School Code.

During the month of May, our school counselors and our administrators worked together to place a spotlight on positive mental health. Each week in May, students and staff participated in activities that included strategies to improve mental health, as well as help to eliminate the stigma associated with this important topic being discussed nationwide.

Activities regarding taking time to enjoy your surroundings, being positive and kind, doing your best and persevering, as well as practicing self-regulation and mindfulness were a part of the month's focus. Each school's activities were geared towards the ages of the students they serve, but the message of improving mental health was consistent across the district.

This project is a bookend discussion about Youth Mental Health in Palisades which was held in the fall, featuring panelists like Melissa Groden from the Council of Southeast PA, Beth Hall from Lakeside Educational Network, Kristi Hoover who is an Assistant District Attorney from the Bucks County Attorney's Office, Katie Lloyd who is a Licensed Professional Counselor employed by Palisades School District, Chief Mike McDonald from Springfield Township Police and Dave Stiansen from Haycock Ministries in Kintnersville. The event was hosted by our Superintendent, Dr. Bridget O'Connell and Assistant to the Superintendent for Educational Programs, Dr. Michael Donnelly. Each panelist provided their take on what we can do together to help improve youth mental health in Palisades. The cover page of our last community newsletter outlines a few ideas to help promote positive mental health for the youth in our community including:
